

Working abroad after the EU accession

Joining the EU in 2004 has strengthened the emigration from Hungary, which started to develop at the change of regime (losing its former strictly controlled and restricted character). Mainly labour force migration has increased, in spite of the fact that only three old Member States – United Kingdom, Ireland and Sweden – opened their labour markets immediately.

Especially the first two countries have become a major new target of Hungarians who wanted to work abroad (while Germany preserved its top position as the most important target country of Hungarians), due to their high income levels, high work force demand and language. More than 51,000 Hungarian citizens were registered in the United Kingdom between the beginning of May 2004 and the end of September 2010, and the corresponding figure was about 22,000 in Ireland. The number of registrations grew year by year from 2004 and it started the decline after 2008, probably due to the economic recession.



However, compared to most of the Member States that joined the EU in 2004, Hungarian labour force migration has remained modest. During the previously mentioned period, the proportion of Hungarian citizens among workers who arrived from the new EU-8 Member States to Ireland and the United Kingdom was only 4.2-4.4%. If we compare the number of migrants to the population of the country of origin, all Member States except for Slovenia and the Czech Republic precede Hungary regarding labour force migration to the above mentioned target countries.
